YOUTH SEXUALITY TASK GROUP

Recently, the Task Group on Youth Sexuality was created at Batshaw. This work is part of a mandate given to the Youth Centres by the Regional Board of Montreal Centre as part of the Community Action Program for STD/HIV prevention. The mandate of the task group is:

- To facilitate initiatives coming out in the field of helping youth live more responsible and loving relationships.
- To help in the development of sexual education programs for Batshaw youth relating to their own life experiences.
- To support programs that will better inform and equip staff and foster families to talk about sexuality.
- To support the implementation of programs on sexual education throughout Batshaw.

Members of the Batshaw Task Group cover most sectors of our organization. Members include: Barbara Kemp, Head Office; Marie Leduc and Marlene Baumel, Health Services; Melissa Edward, CCC; Charlotte Gibson, Foster Family Association; Ruth Potts, Foster Care; Trish White and Virginia Kerr, Residential Services; Carlos de Castro, Youth Protection; Pierrette Laroche, Project 10; and Martine Bernier, resource person for STD/HIV prevention.

One of the Task Group's first projects will be to commemorate World AIDS Day on December 1st, 1999. You will all be invited to do something to sensitize your environment to this epidemic that particularly touches our youth.

NEW PRÉVOST BACKUP/ADMISSIONS SERVICE

Planning has gone on over the last few months to create a new backup and admissions service on the Prévost campus. These new initiatives will help increase stability in client life at the campus. One of the measures to be implemented is the creation of a unit which will respond to the backup needs in the division of Residential Treatment Services for Adolescents. These are situations where a young person becomes highly unstable and a risk to self or others.

Currently the beds used to respond to these situations are spread out over a few units. This can have the effect of stretching the ability of these units to respond to their other clients. The new backup unit will take responsibility for most of the backup offered within the division. The program will use a combination of social skill acquisition and problem solving approaches, and will be a partnership with the security service of the campus.

At the same time a new approach will be taken to the admission and orientation of new arrivals at the campus. There are over 600 admissions every year. Therefore, managing these arrivals in a consistent and planned manner will make a positive contribution to both the experience of the young person and to the smooth running of the units on campus. Some renovations are required to accommodate both services. It is hoped they will be operational by the new year.
