YOUTH PROTECTION WAITING LISTS

In December the waiting lists for Youth Protection Services were at the lowest they have been in several years. On December 10th the waiting list for Evaluation/Orientation was down to six cases. As Batshaw's capacity to accomplish evaluations is 36 per week, these cases will be responded to within less than a week.

On December 17th the waiting list for Application of Measures was 15, down from a peak of 130 earlier this year. This represents an outstanding accomplishment by the Evaluation/ Orientation and Application of Measures teams who have weathered the stress of coping with waiting lists for a very long time.

It is also evidence of the impact of the on site verification program. This program deals with cases at the earliest possible moment, reducing the number of reports (signalments) deemed received, and thereby reducing the number of evaluations to be done and the need subsequently for Application of Measures. Operated jointly by the signalement verification and family preservation teams, this program and much of the progress Batshaw has made on its Youth Protection waiting lists would not have been possible without the additional \$500,000 support made available by the Regional Health and Social Services board this past year.

WORLD AIDS DAY

More than 60 Batshaw staff and clients were present on December 1st, 1999 to congratulate the winners of the World AIDS Day contest for Batshaw youth. Over twenty posters, essays and poems had been entered addressing the question: "HIV/AIDS: are you at risk?"

In his opening remarks Michael Udy, Executive Director reminded people how our young clients are truly at risk. On average, youth in placement usually become sexually active at 13 years of age and roughly 50% of girls in placement have been sexually abused. It is our responsibility to assist all youth in understanding, preventing and dealing with at risk behaviors.

To commemorate World AIDS Day, many agency programs made a point of wearing red clothes or the symbolic red ribbon. This was also the case at Health Services, DPS and certain units of the Application of Measures. Marcel Croteau distributed red ribbons to people entering 5 Weredale Park. All youth at Prévost also received red ribbons. All these gestures of solidarity were greatly appreciated.

Many prizes were awarded to the contest winners through the generous support of the Youth Horizons Foundation, the Council for Clients and Community (CCC), McDonald's and HMV Stores. Even the Prévost kitchen staff helped out by preparing a marvelous cake for the event. Thanks to all participants, staff and sponsors that showed their support to the AIDS cause!

NEWS FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
