EXPLOITATION OF YOUTH IS A SERIOUS MATTER

Events have occurred in the past that show that youth who receive services from Batshaw are still vulnerable to exploitation by others, whether they be adults or peers. Sometimes the signs that exploitation is taking place are subtle and hidden from caregivers and concerned people. Perpetrators obviously don't want to reveal themselves. Victims can also conceal their own victimization out of fear, shame, loyalty, or the belief that secondary gains (eg: money, gifts, attention) are more important than the consequences of victimization.

Networks of people sometimes carry out exploitation. Sometimes it is practiced by one person, but repeatedly with many victims. To carry out its mandate of protection Batshaw has to maximize its ability to detect exploitation and act against it. To do so, one of the measures in place is a central person to whom all staff, volunteers and any other concerned person, can report any piece of information or suspicion. This person is:

By having all information pass before the eyes of the same person, we expect to increase our chances of detecting patterns and connections, which might otherwise go unnoticed. Liz is in a position to bring other resources into play, including our own security services and our relationship with the police. Protection of children and youth is the concern and obligation of everyone connected to Batshaw. Play your part by reporting to Liz anything that causes you concern in this regard.
