The conference was quite successful, the presentations went well, and we had participation from people representing all segments of the social service network. Our Youth Committee took on the responsibility of one of the Teen Beliefs Workshop and did an extraordinary job. Tony Maciocia and his capable crew gave us a big hand with the BBQ lunch.

The CCC is one of the few Users' Committees organizing conferences on a yearly basis. The participation of its members speaks to the quality of the conference and to the richness of this community.

"THEY NOTICE"

On April 23rd this year, Mrs. Marion Lowe-McLean received the Woman of Distinction Award for 2003 from the YWCA in the category of Community Service.

Mrs. Lowe-McLean is known to the Batshaw community first and foremost as a dedicated foster parent. She has fostered children since 1975. Over the years she has raised her own daughters, cared for her mother and some 17 foster children. In 1999 she began to focus her fostering on young women who were preparing for independent living. In March 2001 Mrs. Lowe-McLean's home was destroyed by a devastating fire. However, afterwards she was able to resume care of two of the young women and help them complete the process of moving off on their own, before deciding to retire from fostering.

Mrs. Lowe-McLean has been very active in other parts of the community. A teacher by training she has had a long association with many schools, including John Grant School and SHAD Academy. She was a founding member of the Québec Board of

Black Educators and the Black Theatre Workshop; a member of The Colored Women's Club, The Congress of Women and The Black Congress of Women. She has prepared training programs addressing racism and tolerance, and explored spirituality through studies in metaphysics and holistic healing arts. Mrs. Lowe-McLean has made involvement in her community her passion and life-work. Who better to honor as Woman of Distinction for the year? At Batshaw she has all our thanks, and our admiration. We are very happy for her that the wider community has taken notice and bestowed honor on her.

CLSCs PARTICIPATE IN COMPETENCY-BASED TRAINING PROGRAM

All of Batshaw's clinical staff and managers are participating in the competency-based training program known as PNF (Programme national de formation). Recently, the Federation of CLSCs decided to participate. Discussions between the Montréal Regroupement des CLSC, Centre de jeunesse de Montréal and Batshaw Centres led to inclusion of CLSC case workers and managers. This has begun at Batshaw with participation of CLSC managers in the most recent managers' group. Participation of CLSC case workers in groups with Batshaw front-line staff will likely start in the fall. This will help Batshaw and CLSC staff and managers have a greater common understanding and language in their joint work to protect children and help families.

POWWOW IN THE NORTH!

The 6th Annual Powwow was held on Saturday, June 14th, at Prévost campus. The rain held off and we actually saw the sun, briefly. The First Nations culture shone brightly on the central field at Prévost. The traditional drummers and dancers of several Mohawk communities were there in big numbers. We had a hoop dancer who gave some lessons to some daring young people who tried out this difficult art.

We also had a visit from two throat singers from Inuit communities in the far north of Québec. Their skills are truly fascinating as they imitate the sounds from Inuit life through strange (to our ears) vocals that are both haunting and soothing. The Powwow is now firmly established on the summer Powwow circuit, and the smaller but faithful audience shows this is so. Many thanks to Batshaw's Dave Brown, Merv Atta-Segal and Andy Simon, and Kahnawake's Rudy Montour for their year long organizing efforts.
