BATSHAW LAUNCHES PRE-EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (PEP) (Contributed by Tony Maciocia, Program Coordinator in the Division of Residential Treatment Services for Adolescents)

We are pleased to announce the launching of a Pre-Employment Program (PEP), which has been set up in partnership with Les Ateliers du Centre jeunesse de Montréal, Carrefour des jeunes du Sud-Ouest and Batshaw. Funds have been provided by the Centre Local d'Emploi (CLE) du Sud-Ouest

This is a 12-week full-time program (approx. 32. hrs/wk) designed to offer pre-employment training to youth (16+) who have quit school and who are deemed not ready to enter and sustain themselves in the regular job market. Program content centers around workshop-style contract work, supplemented by some classes on employment skills. Youth are paid an hourly rate.

Youth who complete the PEP program can then move on to stage placements with employers in the community.

This general program will accept any Batshaw youth who meets the criteria, space permitting. The working language of this program is French, but some English interventions do occur.

A second part of the PEP is available for unilingual English youth who have some connection to the Southwest area of the city. The content of this program includes French classes on site.
