# Panel discussion on mental illness and the Black Community

On Friday, February 4<sup>th</sup>, a panel of four well-known professionals gave us much food for thought. Dr Jaswant Guzder, Director of Child Psychiatry at the Jewish General Hospital, Shirlette Wint, psychotherapist, Olayinka Renner, Manager in Batshaw's Application of Measures Service, and Myrna Lashley, psychologist and CEGEP teacher, provided us with a wide variety of professional and personal views. Issues related to how mental illness is experienced in black communities, how oppression and marginalization can interact with mental illness, how the language and concepts of mental illness can mask racism, and how important it is for workers to attend to their own mental health, were all explored with thoughtfulness and humour.

After many hours of hard work, attention to detail and organization, "auntie Claire" as she is affectionately referred to by the young performers, with the help of her son Omari, executed their role of co-masters of ceremonies, as they called upon the children of our staff, as well as from the community, church groups, dance schools, etc. to deliver their messages of hope, love and appreciation of family, community pride, and understanding of heritage and culture. One could feel the room bursting with pride as our youth took front and center stage, from the first notes of the Canadian and then South African National Anthems, to the final notes of Barry White.
