We appreciate the cooperation of our colleagues at the Douglas Hospital which has permitted us to reach this point, and look forward to moving on with the project.

UDY FOR PRESIDENT!

Now that I have your attention, I realize it's not modest to write about myself in Apropos, but... Batshaw has been a member of the Child Welfare League of Canada (CWLC) since 1992. The CWLC has over 100 members in all 13 provinces and territories. Many are service-providing agencies like Batshaw. Others are provincial government departments responsible for child welfare, university faculties and provincial child advocates. Other members from Québec are Le Centre jeunesse de Montréal, l'Association des centres jeunesse du Québec, and La Commission des droits de la personne et des droits de la jeunesse.

The League has promoted many well-attended conferences across Canada such as Protecting children, helping adults: Bringing two worlds closer together, to be held in Montréal, May 26-27. It is also a partner in the Centre of Excellence for Child Welfare (CECW). The CECW is a major platform for conducting and disseminating important research in child welfare, holding seminars such as Outcomes in Child Welfare in 2003, and housing valuable research and reference materials on major issues in child welfare, such as the Canadian Incidence Study of Abuse and Neglect. The CWLC has also received many grants to conduct projects that have added tools and knowledge to the child welfare scene. Examples are: the pamphlet "Discipline without hurting" which we have used in Batshaw, and to which our own Foundation contributed funds, and more recently the Canadian demonstration project of the approach to children in foster care known as "Looking After Children" in which Batshaw's Division of Child and Family Services participates. The League has an Outstanding Achievement program which annually recognizes Canadians who have made outstanding contributions in child welfare as volunteers, workers in children's services, foster parents, youth leaders, advocates, and in research and evaluation. Batshaw foster parents Vonnie Ruggles and Mr. and Mrs. Ibrahim Abdelatiff received Outstanding Achievement Awards in 2001 and 2003 respectively, bringing honor and recognition to their fine work, making all of us proud to be associated with them.

I have been a board member of the league since 1996. At the last board meeting in February, I was elected President of the board for the next two years. I am honored and pleased to participate in the leadership of a growing and important organization in our field. Membership on the CWLC board is a volunteer activity and will not take me away from Batshaw any more than it has up to this point. I am very proud of the contribution Batshaw has made to the CWLC over the years. We are a well-known and well-respected participant in the Canadian child welfare community. I am equally proud of the growing contribution the CWLC has been able to make to support the thousands of line workers, managers and researchers across Canada who work every day at improving life for Canadian children at risk and their parents.
