Bourbonnière Group Home celebrated its 20th anniversary on September 29th by hosting a wine and cheese party for its former and current multi-disciplinary team members, associated BYFC colleagues and community partners from the hospitals, school board and other community referral centers. Among the guests were the founding members: staff from both the Montreal Children's Hospital (MCH) and the former Shawbridge Youth Centres (SYC).

The group home was created in 1985 through the collaborative work of SYC and the MCH Department of Psychiatry to treat adolescents with psychiatric and/or medical disorders requiring specialized interventions and residential care. A Day Program was added in 1996 to allow for shortened residential stays and more intensive after-care.

Guests heard the results of an informal client follow-up survey carried in the three weeks prior to the party. Fifty of the program's approximately 170 clients since 1985 were randomly contacted by phone and asked four questions.

- In answer to the question "Where are you living now?", we learned that all of the adolescents were living at home or on their own with close ties to their families.
- The second question asked if the client had been re-admitted to either residential or psychiatric care, after their discharge from Bourbonnière. We found that for all but four clients, Bourbonnière was their last admission to residential or psychiatric care.
- The third question asked if the client was working or in school. We learned that all but six of the adolescents were working, in high school, CEGEP or university.
- In answer to the last question "Did Bourbonnière help you to get through a difficult time in your life?" the clients (adolescents and parents) gave only positive responses, with a common theme best represented by one client's words:

"Bourbonnière allowed me to have time out to make the transition from my world to the real world so I could do what I needed to do to be part of it."

Fittingly, a plaque was given to the team with the following inscription:

"To the Bourbonnière group home staff, past, present and in memoriam, for their outstanding commitment to the youth and families of the last 20 years."

DORVAL GIRLS HELP GULF VICTIMS
