FFA-AFRICAN HERITAGE-FASHION SHOW

The youth were all happy and proud to be part of this activity as they were the ones giving the show. They presented the collection of Afri-Carib; a company specialized in African wear for the whole family. One of the youth prepared three jokes which he was happy to present to a very attentive audience.

The foster families strongly believe that these types of activities are positive experiences for the children, which will result in building positive memories. A certificate of participation was given to all the youth. The presentation was followed by a light supper which included West Indian dishes cooked by foster families, as well as pizzas, juices and donuts which were provided by the CCC. Despite the nasty weather, the fashion show was presented in a warm and cozy ambiance.

A STORY OF PARTNERSHIP

Two years ago, Batshaw approached the community of Lachine in order to start a project to work with Anglophone families who are already identified as neglectful or at risk. We know from the work of Carl Lacharité and his team at UQTR, that to work with neglect it is necessary to work with the community in order to create the conditions necessary for families to be successful.

Since that time a partnership was created that includes the CLSC, 2 schools and 4 community organizations not to mention involvement with *la Table de la Petite Enfance*. This partnership brought to life the first services that are run in English: an after-school homework program, a parent's support group and a parent/child stimulation group, all of which are now successfully operating. All this is created without an exterior source of funding, but rather through the commitments of the member organizations.

Inspired through the work of the Duff Court Project, and with the help of its partners, on February 9th, the CSSS of LaSalle et du Vieux Lachine invited its community partners to a conference with Carl Lacharité in order to take time together to "think differently" about child neglect. This conference brought many different organizations together: the schools, community organizations. Enthusiasm was high and the door has been opened for more collaborative efforts to help create the conditions needed for families to succeed.

This is what partnerships can accomplish.
