9th ANNUAL POW WOW "HONORING OUR YOUTH" (Contributed by Andy Simon, Team Leader, Bridges)

On Saturday June 17th, from noon till 4 p.m., BYFC's Prévost campus in collaboration with the people of Kahnawake will come alive with the sights, sounds and smells of Aboriginal culture as native communities entertain and educate spectators of all ages.

This year will mark our 9th annual pow wow. Representatives from First Nations throughout Quebec, Ontario and B.C. will gather together to showcase their culture. Food from the Cree Nation will be available for sampling. Roasted beaver, bear, moose, caribou, wild goose, sturgeon and lake trout are all on the menu, accompanied by bannock, native bread. Inuit throat singers, Iroquois and Mohawk dancers, and a Mohawk host drum "Big Stone" are among the performers present to exhibit the traditional dances and music of their communities. Singers Claude McKenzie, formerly of Kashtin, and Donna Jacobs from Kahnawake may also put in an appearance and contribute to the entertainment. Events such as prayers by Chief Mike Retasket from Bonapart Indian band in British Columbia and the "walking out" ceremony for Cree Nation toddlers will be performed. First Nations veterans and Canadian Peacekeepers will also be honoured in a ceremony. We will host special guests from the Kahnawake and Morin

Heights Legions as well as members of the 2nd Canadian Ranger Patrol Group many of whom are native.

This feast of colour and culture will be held "rain or shine". In the case of poor conditions the event will be moved under the arena roof.

In hosting this event, BYFC create a venue to sensitize nonnatives, both within the agency and in the community, to the First Nations cultures. In the multicultural society that we live in, tolerance of differences is important. The pow wow is an experiential way to convey this message.

Admission and parking is free for all. Native crafts will be showcased. Food and beverage will be for sale throughout the day.
