# SUICIDE PREVENTION WEEK

The Association québécoise de prévention du suicide organizes a yearly suicide prevention week, it took place February 4-10. Posters were distributed to all Batshaw points of services. The objective is to break the isolation of individuals (men, in particular, do not tend to reach out for help) who consider suicide, sensitize the general population to the fact that the suicidal process is reversible and that suicide can be prevented through a collective effort. These messages are all the more appropriate for Batshaw as we move ahead in implementing the Suicide Prevention Protocol. ### **KWANZAA CELEBRATION**

Batshaw's 7<sup>th</sup> Kwanzaa Celebration took place on December 14<sup>th</sup>. The underlying values were introduced so that all in attendance could appreciate the meaning and message of Kwanzaa. These values are called Nguzo Saba which in Swahili means the Seven Principles. These principles represent values and vital teachings of the African ancestors on how to live just and meaningful lives. It also teaches us how to relate to each other and the world.

This Kwanzaa was also special because of the passing of Joy Lepage. It was Joy Lepage who originally researched the information and entrusted me with the task of organizing the celebration. I found it an honor and truly fitting to mention Joy using Nguzo Saba to highlight her qualities and some of her beliefs.

During the celebration children and youth expertly explained the seven principles, recited poetry and lit the seven candles of the Kinara (candle holder). They also played the Gymlby drums under the expert guidance of their instructor Franklyn Lewis, and performed traditional dances. The symbols of Kwanzaa were on display and there was a traditional "feast" for all to enjoy at the end of the evening. Sayida Bruno provided the spiritual guidance, and it was clear by the response of the audience that filled the auditorium that the message of Kwanzaa was clearly communicated and the celebration very much enjoyed by all.

Special thanks to everyone who made this event such a success, including those who volunteered their time to help raise funds to sponsor the celebration, and who took the time to attend. We all can learn and benefit from the lessons and values of Kwanzaa that emphasize everyone's obligation to strive and struggle to improve the world in which we live.
