## <u>HUMAN TRAFFICKING, A PHENOMENON NOT</u> WELL KNOWN

Human trafficking is a phenomenon that is not well known. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP, 2005) estimates that each year more than 600 people are victims of trafficking in Canada within the framework of the sexual exploitation, more than 800 in markets such as domestic work, factory and agricultural work, and between 1500 to 2200 people are transported from Canada to the United States.

Hélène Choquette, filmmaker, spent a year to research the phenomenon of human trafficking. She met with Batshaw's workers and that's how Batshaw Centres participated in the making of the documentary *Avenue Zéro*. In this documentary, three workers (Dorli Fischer, Shelley Taylor and Lynn Dion) along with one girl, talk about the sexual exploitation of youth.

The movie premiere was presented on November 12 during the *Rencontres internationales du documentaire de Montréal* at the *Grande Bibliothèque* and again on November 16 at the *Cinéma Parallèle*.

The film will also be presented from January 21 to 31, 2010 at the NFB Cinema. The movie is in French with subtitles. It's a must!

## MORE THAN \$165 000 FOR CHILDREN IN YOUTH PROTECTION

The foundations of youth centres across Quebec raised more than \$165,000 thanks to a fund-raising activity organized in collaboration with Corus radio stations at the end of October. Our youths will directly benefit from the donations received during those 4 days, to cover the costs of schooling, as well as cultural and sporting activities.

It all started in 2008 when Paul Arcand of 98.5 FM, organized a spontaneous campaign following the publication of an article stating that a *Centre Jeunesse de Montréal* fund-raising activity had been cancelled.
