Getting closer, I realize they are full of perishables temporary stocked there: turkeys, dozens of them, litres of milk, margarine, etc.! A rather unusual thing to see!

In the auditorium, everybody is working hard. Boxes are set in rows. Cathy Carrol, Ola Dupelcyz and their colleagues are filling them with food and presents. In no time, the boxes are more than full. When preparing the

baskets, they make sure the goods will specifically suit the needs of each family. As a result of all this work, many families will have a brighter holiday because of everyone who gave food and money.

Cathy, Manager of Social Services at Boscoville was "back home" to maintain the tradition she launched more than 15 years ago along with Ola, Administrative Technician in the Division of Child and Family Services.

DO YOU KNOW FRANK CAMPANILE?

Frank is an Adminitrative Agent, class 1. We don't see him a lot maybe because he works in the archives in the basement of 6, Weredale Park. Did you know he solicits and gets presents for our youths and has been doing so for more than 25 years? This year he collected 462! A record! Frank was especially happy this year because he also raised money he gave to our Foundation, who, in turn will help our youths.

Frank was telling me the results of his first campaign were modest. But because he persevered, results got better year after year to become simply outstanding!

For each of our youth to receive a present might seem quite simple, but taking a closer look makes anyone realize that achieving this task requires a lot of work. Just think about it. Early fall, Frank contacts the companies - more of them every year - who participated in the past. At the same time, a list of all the youths to receive a present is made. Each youth has its own "data profile" sheet. On it: first name, sex, age, size he/she wears, if suffering from a specific incapacity, if his/her development ties in with his/her age, name of the worker and a few suggestions of presents the youth would like to receive. This being done, Frank sends the right number of youths' data profiles to the participating companies. They in turn, distribute a sheet to each of their employees who choose to give a nicely wrapped present to one of our youths.

All the presents are then stocked in a special room in which tables are piled on other tables to be able to hold them all, and to then facilitate their dispatching. To see all those nicely wrapped presents in a rather small room is simply amazing! The tedious work is now ready to start: finding the present intended to each youth and putting it under his worker's name. This being done, Frank and his colleagues prepare one or more bags depending on the size of the presents, for each worker. They, in turn, come and pick them up and then distribute them to their clients.

For over 25 years, Frank has dedicated himself quietly to this wonderful initiative. It is time to recognize it by sharing it with everyone. Thank you Frank and many thanks also to all those who help you!

MDC PROFESSIONAL DAY

On November 12th, the 10th annual Batshaw Centres Multi-Disciplinary Council Professional Day was held at 6 Weredale Park. Registration numbers were in the low hundred and came from all clinical departments. After opening speeches and a brief but very funny sketch by Steven Abrams, the plenary session introduced the day with a research presentation by Dr. Renée Latulippe on the lifestyle and behaviors associated with the drug habits and sexually transmitted infections of Québec group home youth. The rest of the day rolled out a myriad of workshops all presented by our very own talented clinical staff.

The organizing committee has read all the submitted evaluation forms to gather recommendations and generate ideas for next year. Some of the themes that have emerged can be grouped into:

- Topic suggestions for future MDC workshops:
 - 1. Examples of projects or therapy for children with eating disorders;
 - Addressing problematic family dynamics and/or mental health issues;
 - Intervention methods for working with traumatized youth;
 - 4. Female gangs: information, programs and interventions;
 - 5. Female sexual abuser: information, interventions, profiles etc.;
 - 6. Separation/loss experiences in giving up a child;
 - 7. Criteria and process of becoming a foster parent;
 - 8. More workshops about working with the Aboriginal Community and their realities etc.;
 - 9. Maintaining professionalism.
- o Follow-up information to presented workshops:
 - More information on how to implement the ARC (Attachment Self-Regulation and Competency) approach;
 - 2. More information on Circle of Courage implementation;
 - 3. What are the implications of Dr. Latulippe's study for our interventions?
 - 4. Follow-up to pilot projects presented.
- Suggestions about improvements to the structure of the day or presentations:
 - 1. More humor in workshops;
 - 2. More practical workshops and "how-to" presentations.

This is by no means the whole list but hopefully this will trigger many of you to put on your thinking caps for next year and consider a presentation. Some of the suggestions received will be passed on to your MDC for follow-up as potential staff development possibilities.

The organizing committee would like to extend a hearty thank you to all the presenters as well as the support staff who work behind the scenes to make this event possible.
